Yakusugi Land

[Yakushima Natural Recreation Forest(Arakawa Area)]

Yakusugi Land spreading over an area of 270 hectares and at altitudes around 1000 to 1300 meters, is located 15 kilometers from Anbo. Because of its beautiful nature and virgin forest with many yakusugi cedar trees and easy access, it was designated as a Natural Recreation Forest along with Shiratani Unsuiyko Ravine in Shiratani area in March of 1974. There are five trail courses to choose from according to the level of difficulties and lengths, including the celestial forest course established in April 2018. Many distinguished and unique yakusugi cedar trees with individual names such as Buddhasugi can be seen throughout Yakusugi Land. Yakusugi Land with its picturesque streams flowing through a lush flora of green thick moss and plants embodies the essence of a Yakusugi forest. You may experience up-close the cyclic mechanism of the forest and come to know its history and people.

The 30- and 50-minute hiking courses are well maintained. (Parts of the courses are wooden walkways and parts are paved in stone.) The 80-, 150-, and 210-minute courses are mountain trails. Please check your equipment and know your physical condition for your climb.

- 30-minute course (about 0.8km)
- 50-minute course (about 1.2km)
- 80-minute course (about 2.0km)
- 150-minute course (about 3.0km)
- 210-minute course (about 4.4km)

The rest house was built to blend in with the surrounding environment. There is a gift shop on the ground floor where you can buy original Yakusugi handicrafts. Food is not sold, but some drinks are available for purchase. Upstairs one can relax and enjoy the panoramic view of Mt. Tachu and the surrounding forest.

Fureainomichi Path

Fureainomichi Path is a maintained 30-minute hiking course. Many stumps, remnants of loggings that took place about 300 years ago, can still be seen along the trail. It is a popular course where one can experience the richness of nature and history of the forest.

Kohanayama Path

It is a course where one can see to start with many yakusugi cedar trees and enjoy a forest of giant trees at your own pace. The forest has fully recovered from the logging during the Edo period and has transmuted into a beautiful kosugi cedar forest where many distinguished yakusugi cedar trees such as Tenchusugi, Hahakosugi, and Mitsunesugi cedars can be seen up close. In addition, on this course at point 15, a junction, the path forks off to a trail leading to Tenmon-no-mori Forest and ends at Mt. Tachu. At the summit of Mt. Tachu you will see a pillar of stone rising towards the heavens.

Things to keep in mind when hiking

1. Please stay on the mountain trails.
2. Please do not stray off the trails. Plants and tree roots can be damaged from your treading on them.
3. Yakushima Natural Recreation Forest is maintained to be as natural and untouched as possible. Be aware of natural hazards such as falling branches and trail conditions. Be alert and take extra care when walking on the trails.
4. We strongly recommend you not using your mobile phones while walking on the trails. It is essential that you keep your mind on the trail. It may be very dangerous.
5. Course times indicated on the map are based on the average time an adult will need to finish a course. Please give yourself plenty of time to enjoy your hike.
6. In the mountains, especially during winter, daylight will pass quickly so please be aware of your time.

210-minute course (Tenmon-no-mori Course)

Tenmon-no-mori Course was opened in April 2018. This course incorporates the 150-minute course with an extension from Jamonsugi Cedar to Tenmonnomori Forest, about 1.4 km round trip making the entire course 210-minutes long. You can see many yakusugi cedar trees and a forest covered with deep green moss. Tenmonnomori Forest is one of the five fixed designated forests for academic research and information gathering on Yakushima.

Domaiboku (remnants of trees)

During the Edo era, Yakusugi cedar trees were logged and processed into flat boards and used as roof shingles. Only parts of trees that could be easily processed were selected. The remaining unusable parts were discarded and because of its high content of resin, it remained without decaying. These remnants of Yakusugi cedar trees are called "domaiboku".
